the quality of being worthy of honor or respect






Commonwealth Fund 2001 Health Care Quality Survey




Being Seen: Dignity Therapy

- * Brief, individualized, evidenced-based psychotherapy for adults
- * Typically performed in
 - 4 Sessions over 2-4 weeks



Dignity Therapy Sessions

- 1) Consult
- 2) Dignity Therapy Interview
- 3) Editing Session
- 4) Final Presentation of Legacy Document



Dignity Therapy Question Protocol

- -Can you tell me about your life history; particularly those parts you either remember most or think are the most important?
- -When did you feel the most alive?
- -What are the most important roles you have played in life?
- -What are your most important accomplishments; what do you feel most proud of?

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Protocol (continued)

-What are your hopes and dreams for your loved ones?

-What have you *learned about life* that you may want to pass along to others?

-What advice or words of guidance would you wish to pass along to your _____ (son, daughter, wife, parents, others)?

Lessons Learned
