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COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS

This course examines the history of racial and ethnic communities in San Diego (and beyond San Diego during the COVID-19 pandemic) through active and sustained engagement with community-based organizations. We will study the ways that histories of global capitalism, colonialism, displacement, and war have disproportionately impacted particular communities of color, resulting in their vulnerabilities to state violence and premature death. These vulnerabilities have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, as immigrant and refugee communities already experiencing economic precarity find themselves struggling to access emergency medical provisions, childcare, and other relief. This course allows students to engage in grassroots community-building efforts in response to the current crisis. Students will supplement their text-based knowledge by conducting community-based research, including oral history. By the end of the course, students will have developed core public and digital humanities skills, built relationships with a community partner, and contributed to the collection and preservation of oral histories for future scholarship on racial and ethnic communities and on the COVID-19 pandemic.

There are two main assignments for this course: Oral History and Group Project.

Oral History (45%)

In collaboration with your community partner, you will identify a person affiliated with the organization to conduct an oral history. The components of this assignment are:

- 1) Interview proposal and questions (Due: Thursday April 23; Week 4)
- 2) Complete one oral history (Due: Thursday May 14; Week 7)
- 3) Complete transcription of oral history (Due: Thursday May 28; Week 9)
- 4) Write a short (400-500 word) description of your interviewee and reflection of the interview process (Due: Tuesday June 9; Finals week)

Group Project (45%)

Groups will comprise 3-5 students working with the same community partner on the assigned projects.

- 1) Each group will showcase/present their project virtually during Week 10.
- 2) Each group will produce a reflection (1,000-1,400 word) of the project. **Your grade will be determined in consultation with your community partner.**
